In a Nutshell

Koru is an accelerated, on-the-job training programme for those who are entering a new area of work. This could be those who have recently qualified, and would benefit from support as they start interpreting in the community, or those who have a minimum of 2 and half years' post-qualification experience and want to develop essential interpreting skills in preparation for VRS.

What to Expect

- Comprehensive New Hire Training
- 10 weeks (for community interpreters) and 14 weeks (for VRS interpreters) of skill-building and practice
- Support from a mentor and lead interpreters
- Work as a staff interpreter while taking advantage of specialised training

Koru offers a comprehensive programme to help you ease into community interpreting or VRS work and polish essential interpreting skills.

- Observation time to see your peers in action
- Hands on practice to help you get comfortable in a new area of work
- Supported phone time for those on the VRS stream, so you have a helping hand if needed

Programme Overview

- 1 Koru is a 10 to 14-week training programme designed to support candidates who are recently qualified* or any interpreter who is at least 2 and half years' qualified and interested in working in VRS.
- 2 The programme will begin with New Hire Training (NHT) and progress to Guided Observations, Deliberate Practice Labs, Sandbox and shadowing, all supported by a mentor.
- After the New Hire Training, interpreters will have several weeks to focus on honing their interpreting skills through the Koru programme webinars, eLearnings, group mentoring sessions, and deliberate practice calls (VRS only) are all part of the development plan.
- 4 Once the majority of the training is complete, interpreters will be able to observe others working as well as interpret those scenarios themselves, with support.
- 5 Enrolled interpreters will complete benchmarks, self-reflections and skill analyses that will be used to support their growth throughout the programme.
- 6 Completion of the programme is achieved by meeting the standard quality assurance requirements and completing all programme course work.
- Interpreters will have an opportunity to continue to grow their skills after completion of the programme through self analysis training and professional development planning.
- 8 Community interpreters who might be interested in VRS work, can complete the final remaining 4 weeks of the course work when they reach 2 and half years' experience as a qualified interpreter.

The Perks of Participating in Koru

- Short 10 to 14-week programme
- Interpreters are hired as employed staff members working a minimum of 10.5 hours per week. They will be interpreting at least 7.5 hours per week, with averaging 3 hours of paid training time on top
- Enrolled interpreters will be able to work in appropriate settings, including community interpreting, VRI, corporate interpreting or other areas while completing their community or VRS training
- Interpreters' skills, experience, and background are honoured while in Koru
- Training and deliberate practice prepare interpreters for independent community and VRS work in a few short weeks

Frequently Asked Questions



Who is eligible for the Koru programme?

Anyone in an approved location, who has recently qualified, for the Community Interpreting stream, or anyone who is 2 and a half years' qualified for the VRS stream. All interpreters must take an initial assessment prior to the offer of a place.

• How long is the programme?

The programme is 10 weeks for the community stream, and 14 weeks for the VRS stream. Training time is approximately 3 hours per week, with additional hours spent interpreting.

Are all 14 weeks of the programme paid?

Yes. All interpreters in the programme will be Sorenson staff interpreters who will be paid for a minimum of 10.5 hours per week, including 7.5 hours of interpreting and 3 hours of training.

What happens after the interpreter completes the programme?

The interpreter will be offered additional interpreting time as appropriate for their current skill level.

Q Is an interpreter required to complete any other training after the programme?

Yes. Interpreters will complete Limited Impact Debriefing and 999 BSL* training after successful completion of the programme.
